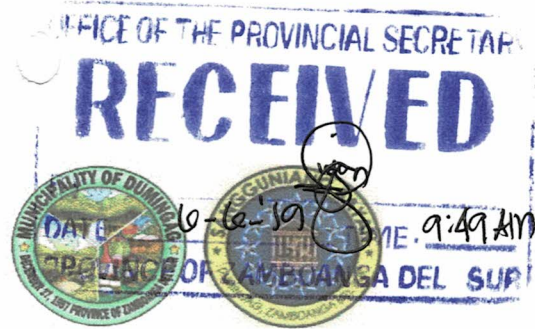

Municipal Ordinance No. 4, s. 2019

AN ORDINANCE INSTITUTIONALIZING VOLUNTARY BLOOD DONATION PROGRAM IN THE MUNICIPALITY OF DUMINGAG, ZAMBOANGA DEL SUR AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFORE.

Be it ordained by the Sangguniang Bayan in session assembled that:

SECTION 1. TITLE.

This ordinance shall be cited as “Paduguay Program” in the municipality of Dumingag.

SECTION 2. PURPOSES AND LEGAL BASIS.

Blood is vital for life. There is no better substitute for blood than blood itself. Blood transfusion is a felt need of the community and it is one of the basic services governments must provide.

To promote genuine public health, there is a need to encourage and support voluntary blood donation by every citizen and to instill public health consciousness of the principle that a blood donation is a humanitarian act.

Blood donation is a form of advocacy that efficiently protects millions of lives, especially in emergency situations, thus, must be effectively enhanced and regionalized. It is an essential part of the professional medical service and which is not for sale, and that blood donation was put into various programs by different hospitals, entities, establishments, or institutions, and thus, it is imperative that blood donation program should also be regulated.

It shall be the purpose of this ordinance by which RA 7719, otherwise known as the “National Blood Services Act of 1994 or an Act Promoting Voluntary Blood Donation”, to provide a local mechanism for the adequacy of supply of safe blood and the regulation of blood supply.

The Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) issued Memorandum Circular No. 96-6, dated April 24, 1996, mandating the integration of the voluntary blood donation services and program into the local financial work plan and budget as an added function of the local health board of LGUs.

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One of the agenda of Genuine People's Agenda (*Municipal Ordinance no. 1, s. 2017*) is to promote public health. Section 4, Agenda No. 8 "Adopt a Responsive Health Care System and Integrative Medicine" strengthen the PADUGOAY Program (Blood-Letting) in the Municipality of Dumingag.

SECTION 3. OBJECTIVES. This ordinance aims to:

- Promote and encourage voluntary blood donation in the entire municipality;
- Instill public consciousness of the principle that a blood donation is a humanitarian act and that the provision of blood for transfusion is not a sale or commodity;
- Provide for adequate, safe, affordable and equitable distribution of supply of blood and blood products;
- Inform the public of the benefits and the need for voluntary blood donation to curb the hazards caused by the commercial sale of blood;
- Mobilize all the sectors of the community to participate in programs and activities on a voluntary and non-profit collection of blood;
- Obtain the 1% blood collection from the total population in the entire municipality; and
- Promote a culture of voluntary blood donation as vital measure on emergency preparedness nationwide.

SECTION 4. SCOPE.

This ordinance shall be applicable to all qualified blood donors within the definition of the terms referred, concerned departments of the municipal government and all public and private juridical persons in the municipality.

SECTION 5. DEFINITION OF TERMS.

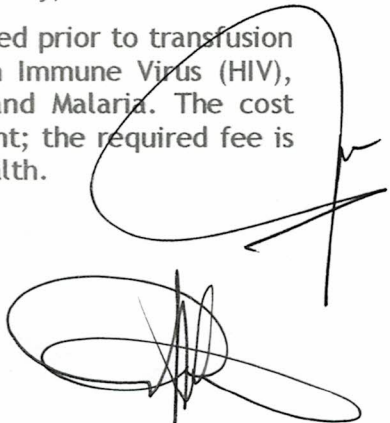
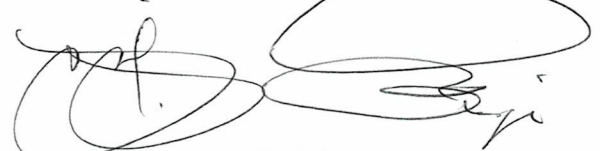
As defined in this ordinance, the following terms shall mean:

- a) **Blood** – refers only to whole blood, packed red cells and fresh frozen plasma. It does not include other blood components like platelet concentrate;
- b) **Blood Donation** – occurs when a person voluntarily has blood drawn and used for transfusions that you give to a hospital or clinic so that it can be given to someone who needs it;
- c) **Blood Donor** - refers to any qualified, healthy individual fit to donate blood on his/her own volition or initiative without monetary compensations;
- d) **Blood Donor Registry** – refers to the collection and sharing of data about donated blood and ineligible donors with their ABO group and RH type, identity and contact information (e.g. complete name, address & telephone/cellular phone number, e-mail address);
- e) **Walking Blood Donors** - refers to an individual included in the list of qualified blood donors who is ready to donate blood when needed in his/her community;
- f) **Serology Test** - refers to examination done in the blood units donated prior to transfusion which is limited to Hepatitis B Surface Astrogen (HBsAg), Human Immune Virus (HIV), Hepatitis C Virus (HCV), Syphilis/Rapid Plasma Reagent (RPR), and Malaria. The cost incurred for serology test is charged to the requesting party/patient; the required fee is prescribed through a memorandum issued by the Department of Health.

SECTION 6. QUALIFICATIONS OF DONORS.

The following qualifications to donate blood are as follows:

- must be in good general health;
- weigh at least 110 pounds;
- at least 16 years old and not more than 55 years old; and
- if 16 years old with written consent from parent and/or guardian.



SECTION 7. CREATION OF DUMINGAG BLOOD DONATION COUNCIL.

The Dumingag Blood Donation Council shall be created and organized whose composition shall be the following:

From Education Sector (Public and Private)
From Business Sector
From Labor Sector
From National Line Agencies
Indigenous People

Functions of the council: The Council shall be responsible for:

- Implementing the policy and programs this ordinance;
- Serve as a focal point through which various organizations and individuals work together cooperatively in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of programs;
- Provide for an effective mechanism for the coordination of existing services and programs and those which might be developed in the immediate futures;
- Provide mechanism to obtain funds, volunteers, facilities and technical expertise; and
- Perform other related responsibilities as may be assigned by competent authorities.

SECTION 8. IMPLEMENTING GUIDELINES.

- The Administrative Board shall meet once a month or as often as necessary at the discretion of the chairperson or at the call of a majority of the members of the Board.
- The Anti-Drug Abuse Council shall meet once a month or as often as necessary at the discretion of the chairperson or at the call of a majority of the members of the council.

SECTION 9. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.

- Role of Public Health Workers** - Personnel of the Municipal Health Office, including volunteers like the Barangay Health Workers and the Barangay Nutrition Scholars are enjoined to actively support this voluntary blood donation program, particularly in the advocacy works and recruitment of donors.
- Role of Barangays** - All Barangays of Dumingag, through their respective Barangay Councils and their Health Committees, are likewise enjoined to provide support to this program, particularly during the conduct of public education, recruitment of donors and mass bloodletting.
- Coordination with Schools and Government and Non-Government Organizations** - For purposes of securing volunteer blood donors and other forms of program support, coordination and linkages shall likewise be established with the various organizations, from public and private schools, media and fraternities/sororities.

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SECTION 10. INCENTIVES TO BLOOD DONORS AND PROGRAM SUPPORTERS.

As a rule, non-monetary incentives shall be given to each blood donor and to each entity that supported or helped organize mass bloodletting activity. Tokens or gift certificates or discount cards may also be provided, when available. Municipal employees, who donate blood, may be given a day-off on the day of donation.

SECTION 11. WORLD BLOOD DONORS DAY.

Recognition may also be given to blood donors through a fitting ceremony during the World Blood Donation Day (June 14).

SECTION 12. IDENTIFICATION CARD FOR BLOOD DONORS.

Each volunteer blood donor shall be issued an Identification Card from the Office of the Municipal Mayor containing his full name, birthday, address, contact number, contact person for emergency and blood type. This card shall free of charge and non-transferable.

SECTION 13. SAFEKEEPING OF BLOOD DONOR REGISTRY.

- A copy of the Blood Donors Registry plus their contact numbers, if available, per barangay and categorized donors according to blood type shall be kept by the Office of the Municipal Mayor and a copy furnished to the Municipal Health Office;
- A separate listing of people with special or rare types of blood (e.g. type AB blood or those with RH negative) together with their address and contact numbers, shall be established in the entire municipality, to facilitate coordination and assistance during emergency cases; and
- Participating barangays or entities during mass bloodletting activity may keep their own records, for reference purposes.

SECTION 14. IMPLEMENTING AGENCY.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be enforced by the Office of the Municipal Mayor through Municipal Health Office (MHO).

SECTION 15. APPROPRIATION.

The amount of at least Sixty Thousand Pesos (P60,000.00) shall be appropriated annually for the effective implementation of this ordinance.

SECTION 16. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE.

If any portion of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional, other portions thereof not affected by such declaration shall remain in full force and effect.

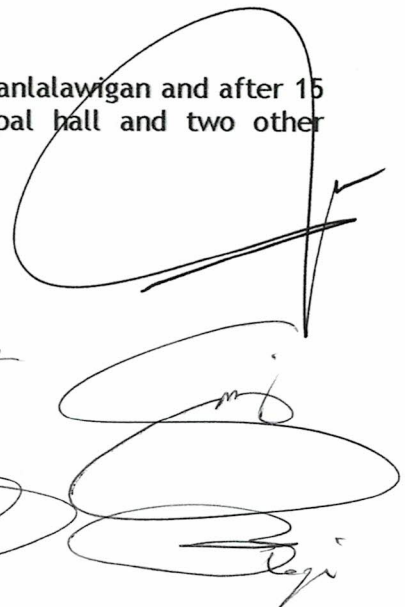
SECTION 17. REPEALING CLAUSE.

Any portion inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance is hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

SECTION 18. EFFECTIVITY CLAUSE.

This ordinance shall take effect after the approval of the Sangguniang Panlalawigan and after 15 days a copy hereof is posted on the bulletin board in the municipal hall and two other conspicuous places.

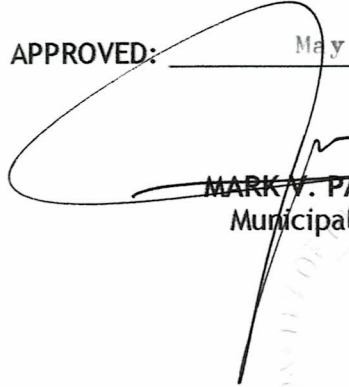

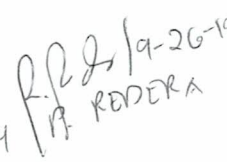
